Most of us know from experience that God directs His people. The Scriptures clearly teach this truth.

“The mind governed by the flesh is death but the mind governed by the Spirit is life and peace.” (Romans 8:6 NIV) If we are governed by someone, they are directing, leading, or influencing us to some noticeable extent. There are several potential origins of the influences which nudge our minds and impact our decisions. How can we recognize when the Spirit of God is directing us rather than our own imagination? The Biblical text just mentioned gives unmistakable importance to assuring that we are led by God’s Spirit and not our own conjuring. One leads to death while the other one leads to life and peace.

Ajith Fernando is the longtime director of Youth for Christ in Sri Lanka. I recently enjoyed reading his book on leadership entitled *Jesus Driven Ministry*. In the chapter called “Affirmed by God,” he offers several practical examples of how to know whether or not the Spirit of God is directing us or if we are being guided by our own whims. Some people misuse the idea that God leads us. When we want to hear certain instructions, it is not too hard to convince ourselves that God is speaking. Fernando offers the practical warning, “Some who should be figuring out solutions to their problems through research and study are expecting God to speak to them directly.” Even after careful research, how can we know which option is the one that God is leading us to follow?

Following are several practical examples inspired by Fernando’s writing which can help us recognize the Spirit’s leading:

- ◆ After careful consideration of the true purpose of a given text in the Bible, we realize that we “happen” to be reading specific instructions for the precise decision we face.
- ◆ A spiritually mature person will observe us and be compelled to offer biblically centered advice for our circumstance.
- ◆ Although they are very tricky to interpret, dreams can call to our attention something that God’s Spirit is trying to show us.
- ◆ Strong impressions of the mind can surface at just the right moment to minister to a particular need.
- ◆ Some otherwise random communication like a sermon, letter, article, or book will give timely and much needed insight into a decision we are laboring to finalize.

- ◆ A windfall of provision such as a gift or unexpected assistance offered by a compassionate person can be God’s Spirit directing our moves.



All subjective leading must be carefully verified against the Word of God. Advice from God will align with the Bible and will be accompanied by sufficient support from others who walk with God. The Apostle John warns us to test and confirm such leading. (1 John 4:1) It is frighteningly easy to substitute our personal aspirations for the leading of the Spirit of God. Don’t let the amount of work necessary to assure that leading comes from the Spirit of God discourage you. Recognizing that leading is from God is worth the effort. ☐✚

Sometimes I am scared of my three-year-old son. The one whose name means "gift from God." The one named after the apostle who was Christ's rock. I think of him as our bulldozer. Our passionate compassionate child of temper so fierce we catch echoes of his berserker ancestors on an otherwise ordinary Friday afternoon in Virginia when I'm scared of what mood he'll be in when I pick him up from preschool. Scared how he'll react if he gets the blue cereal bowl instead of the red one, scared what he'll do if we can't find the Woolworths Teddy Bear come bed time or nap time or car ride time or any old time when he needs it. He can storm harder and longer than my temper can usually take. I am tattered and frayed and frightened of how I am starting to feel about him. Worried that I can't find the necessary reserves of love to remember to like him. I simply want to mute him. So I rock and whisper my secrets into the phone over the baby's wispy soft hair and the dark room co-

coons both of us. My mother-in-law suggests we go back to the beginning. We trace family trees and genes and remember that blue eyes aren't the only things children inherit by blood. I stop being mad at him and instead start to research him. I study my son. And God starts to show me how to see. Not with a magnifying glass, but a mirror. I see my own temper. I see generations of temper before that. I see how lazy my prayers are and how haphazard my approach to helping him. How it's mostly a mixture of

embarrassment and frustration. I see how long it's been since I've enjoyed him. I begin to exercise my motherhood again. I stretch and bend and pray. I fast and pay attention and listen. Instead of floundering in the stories everyone else tells me about him, I begin to draft his narrative. I write it down. How I want to see this son of mine. How I want to teach others to see him. I send these words to his teacher, We so appreciate your partnership. We value Micah and the work that Christ is doing in his heart.

He is extremely sensitive to the stories of Jesus and understands that his name means, "Like unto God" and his second name means "the rock". We are encouraging him to be a man who lives in the blessing of his name and is a leader and encourager and protector of others. I begin to sense Micah growing in my heart with flutters much like when I first felt him moving in my belly. I cradle this new story. It is a relief to be writing it again and not just turning the pages terrified of what

comes next. I pray for him more in one month than perhaps the rest of his months combined. I pray and praying is writing and writing is realizing and realizing is seeing. I see the story God has for my Micah. I speak it out loud over him. Sometimes, in the beginning, when I am still finding the words, only when he's asleep. And when he wakes up and asks me what I'm doing I'm too embarrassed to tell him. I start to make something up, to say I was just checking on him. But then I catch myself and I give the truth to his sleep-grogged ears straight, "I am praying for you. I am praying you will be a great warrior for God's Kingdom." He yawns, whispers, "OK," rolls over.

As I stare at the back of his sleep matted hair. As I listen to him start to snore gently and count the seven, eight, nine stuffed animals surrounding him. As I wonder how he even fits into that bed with all the swords, pliers and puppies clamoring for space alongside I catch something unexpected. My stomach aches with a tender like for this son of mine. I like that this is how he chooses to sleep. I like how it so perfectly illustrates his compassion for all living things. I like how his big, clumsy limbs that he is still growing into are draped diagonally across the bunk. I like that the radio's on because he was dancing for me just before going to bed. I like how he sleeps in the same position as his dad and how he thrives on the same routine every night. I like the glass of water he always asks for and keeps close to his bed just like me. I like the discarded book on dinosaurs he was reading and the pen and note pad he always has under his pillow. I like him so much I can hardly breathe. I just sit in that room between a toy tiger and the radio softly playing and stroke the sweaty forehead of a nearly four-year-old and let the like keep filling me up. All the way to overflowing.

We might disagree and then agree, or maybe we didn't even notice because it was all fine again and smoothed over so quickly. Because the Spirit is so incredibly alive. And powerful. And in charge. And the head of this ekklesia we call church.

This is the Body. I can hardly breathe for the grace. It's immeasurable.

A Heart for God

It seems that in the Church, from the earliest theological writings that we have, there has been this wrestle between the dogma of the believer and the heart of the believer. Is it someone's theology and practice of that theology that makes them a "true" believer or is it the heart of the person for God that makes them a "true" believer. If someone in the church does not have solid theological understanding of

end times, the mode of baptism, or the Church where do they stand on the spectrum of "true" believer? Or, maybe more poignantly put, if someone disagrees with me on any of these three or another theological topic, are they a "true" believer? But on the other hand, can someone just have a heart for God and be on the right track to heaven?

From my background and pre-suppositional position the argument has almost always erred on the side of a person just needing a heart for God. But why would Jesus tell His disciples to make disciples and to "Teach them to obey all that I have commanded you"? (Mt. 28:20) If it was just about a heart for God why did He not stop at "make disciples"? Why too does God tell us in Deuteronomy 6:6-9, "These commandments that I give you today are to be on your hearts. Impress [teach to] them on your children. Talk about them when you sit at home and when you walk along the road, when you lie down and when you get up. Tie them as symbols on your hands and bind them on your foreheads. Write them on the doorframes of your houses and on your gates"?

See, we are to have a heart for God. A heart that is pointing us directly to Him and that is longing for His presence. But...we are to couple that with a firm understanding of His scriptures, commandments, and teachings. 2 Peter 1:5-11 tells us, "...make every effort to add to your faith goodness; and to goodness, knowledge; and to knowledge, self-control; and to self-control, perseverance; and to perseverance, godliness; and to godliness, mutual affection; and to mutual affection, love. For if you possess these qualities in increasing measure, they will

keep you from being ineffective and unproductive in your knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ. But whoever does not have them is nearsighted and blind, forgetting that they have been cleansed from their past sins. Therefore, my brothers and sisters, make every effort to confirm your calling and election. For if you do these things, you will never stumble, and you will receive a rich welcome into the eternal kingdom of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ."

These qualities are counter-cultural. And one would only know to pursue them in increasing measure as Peter says by knowing the scriptures, commandments, and teaching of God in increasing measure. Only those who have a heart for God coupled with a firm understanding of His Word are going to increase in these qualities and confirm their calling and election.

So what is the mark of a "true" believer? So, many times we want to say that "true" believers are those who affirm all the same things we do about God and the Bible. But what if it is about a heart for God coupled by a firm understanding of the core things of salvation? But even that seems a bit too far. God says, that for those [any] who confess their sins, He is able and just to forgive them and cleanse them from all impurity. So, it is about a contrite and pure heart before God that asks forgiveness.

I hope you see the struggle in identifying "true" believers. We should do all that we can to get people to the place where they see their need for God and His forgiveness. When they reach that place we should then do everything we can to help them confirm the calling by helping them with a firm understanding of God's Word, His commandments and teachings. We, as the body and bride of Christ need to be "(1) making disciples...(2) teaching them to obey everything that [God] has commanded [us]."

Instead of checking off the list of things people need to do to be a "true" believer let us make sure they have a heart for God first, one that sees their absolute need for God's grace and mercy. Then let's teach them the core things of God and His plan of salvation. Then, and with a pure heart, let us dive deep into the things of God's greater revelation to us in His Word and His creation. †

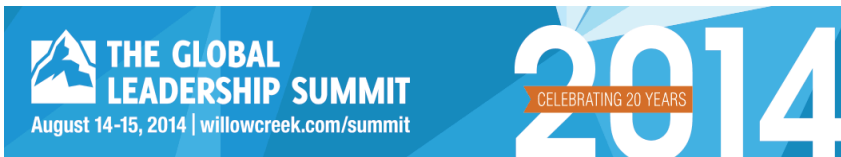
